


### **FAFSA Overview**

**Congratulations!** You've done the hard work in high school to make college a reality. At this point, you've successfully navigated the college admissions process and submitted applications to multiple colleges.

The next step in your process is navigating the complex college financial aid world. The central feature of this process for most college-bound students is the **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)**.

The FAFSA form enables students and their parent(s) to report their income from the previous year to the office of Federal Student Aid (FSA). FSA officers use this information to determine each student's eligibility for grants and loans administered by the federal government, including the Federal Pell Grant. Additionally, Federal Student Aid shares student and parent information with colleges and universities to help financial aid administrators distribute need-based financial aid.





### What is an FSA ID?

The FSA ID is a username and password you will use to complete the FAFSA as well as access other parts of studentaid.gov.

Once your FSA ID is confirmed, it will be fully functional and allow you to create and complete your FAFSA.

#### What You Can Do With Your Account

You must have an account to do the following:

- Complete other online forms (such as the *Master Promissory Note*) required to receive aid
- Review the federal student aid you've received

### Who needs to create an FSA ID?

Anyone required to provide information on a FAFSA form must create an FSA ID.

All students who are eligible for federal student aid need FSA IDs to complete the FAFSA and qualify for financial aid, including the Federal Pell Grant and federal student loans.

For *most* students, *at least one parent* must also create an FSA to provide information as part of the student's FAFSA form.



# Frequently Asked Questions

#### **Should undocumented <u>students</u> create FSA IDs?**

We do not recommend that undocumented students create FSA IDs because they are not eligible for federal financial aid. They should contact the college(s) to which they are accepted for more information.

#### Can undocumented parents create an FSA ID?

Yes! Parents without a Social Security number (SSN) will need to answer identity verification questions to confirm their identity. The questions are based on personal information entered earlier in the process and information from the TransUnion Credit Bureau. Parents can add their Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) to the FAFSA form if they have one.



### FSA ID Guidance for Parents

For most students, at least one parent will also need an FSA ID.


FAFSA considers the student's "parent" to be only their legal (biological or adoptive) parent. Legal guardians and custodians are not considered "parents" by FAFSA. The person who claims a student on tax forms is also not considered when determining a parent.

# Before You Begin

#### To create an FSA ID, you (student) will need:

- ✓ Full legal name
- ✓ Date of birth
- ✓ Social Security Number (SSN)
- Email address
- Cell phone number
- Permanent address



You will need access to both your email account and cell phone to create your FSA ID.



Each Social Security number, email address, and phone number can only be linked to one FSA ID.



Make sure you have 15-20 minutes available. If you stop, you'll have to start from the beginning.






# Step 1 - Visit StudentAid.gov

1. Visit <u>www.studentaid.gov</u> or scan the QR code



2. Click on "Create an Account"



# Step 2 – Click "Get Started"

### Remember, you will need the following:

- Full legal name
- Date of birth
- Social Security Number (SSN)
- Email address
- Cell phone number
- Permanent address


#### What You'll Need

- Your own email address



### Step 3 – Enter Personal Information


- 1. Enter your name exactly as it appears on your Social Security card, U.S. passport, or driver's license.
- 2. Enter your date of birth.
- 3. Enter your Social Security number (SSN) exactly as it appears on your Social Security card or click "What if I don't have a Social Security number?" option for next steps.






### Step 4 – Enter Account Information

- 1. Create a username.
- 2. Enter your email address.
  - Can only associate with one FSA ID
  - Use a reliable personal email address
  - Do not use the email address associated with your school district
- 3. Create a password.
- 4. Write down or record your username and password for future reference!



### Step 5 – Enter Contact Information


- 1. Enter your permanent address. (usually, where you live)
- 2. Provide your cell phone number (strongly recommended)
- 3. Enter your Social Security number (SSN) exactly as it appears on your Social Security card or click "What if I don't have a Social Security number?" option for next steps.





### Step 6 – Communication Preferences


- Select how you would like Federal Student Aid to communicate with you
  - "By email" is <u>highly</u> recommended to get communications as quickly as possible
  - We recommend selecting both "Optional Communications" methods to ensure you don't miss any important information.
- 2. Identify your language preference







# Step 7 – Challenge Questions

- Challenge questions will help unlock your account if you forget your password
- Answers are not case sensitive
- Select questions that have answers you will always remember
- Record the answer in your Notes app



# Step 8 – Confirm & Verify








# Step 9 – Two-Step Verification


- Set up two-step verification for your FSA ID
  - SMS (highly recommended)
  - Email (highly recommended)
  - Authenticator App
- Start the process by clicking "Verify" next to the option
- We recommend setting up <u>at least two</u> methods, so you have multiple options when logging in






# Step 10 – SMS (Text) Verification

- Select "Verify" next to SMS Verification
- You will get a text message with a sixdigit code
- Enter code when prompted and select "continue"



# Step 11 – Email Verification

- You should receive an email with the subject line "Action Required – Verify Your FSA ID Email Address"
- Can't find it? Check your spam and junk folders.
- Enter the 6-digit number from email when prompted




# Step 12 – Confirm Verification

Each type of verification you set up correctly will have a green check mark and say "verified"




We recommend setting up both SMS & email verification!



# Step 13 – Secure Backup Code

- The secure backup code will help you access your account if the other verification methods won't work
- Make note of your backup code and store it somewhere safe
- Check the box once you have and click "Continue"

#### Your Account Was Successfully Created — What's Next?

Before we can grant full account access, we must confirm that your name, Social Security number, and date of birth all match what is on record with the Social Security Administration (SSA). This process takes one to three days. If you verified your email address, you'll receive an email once your information is matched with the SSA.

Your backup code lets you access your account in the event that you cannot use any other two-step verification method.

- · Check the SSA match status of your account information in Account Settings.
- · View your account dashboard, which includes checklists and other

- · Use the Help Center to get answers to common questions.

#### What You Can Do After You've Been Matched

- · Fill out a FAFSA renewal form.
- · Complete and sign forms such as the Income-Driven Repayment Plan Request and Direct Consolidation Loan Application.
- · View your personalized dashboard, your aid information in Aid mmary and notifications and alorts about your acc
